Science

1. Blackout blinds were used on all windows and doorways to reduce the amount of light escaping from houses and businesses, so that enemy bombers would not be able to identify urban areas and subsequently bomb them.

Which is the best material to create a blackout blind? Test a range of materials at home to find out which would make the best blackout blinds for your house.

2. Submarines became powerful forces of action in WWII as they had the ability to hide beneath the surface of the sea, yet still attack ships and boats as they sailed with precious cargos either of provisions or fighting men and their equipment. In order to see where their target was they used periscopes. This was also true of the soldiers who were in the trenches who used periscopes to watch the enemy. Can you design and create your own periscope to look around the corner of your home? We are aware that you may need mirrors for this, so please don't worry if you don't have the materials to do this.
